## NOTE 1. ORGANIZATION AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Organization

Cancer Pathways, formerly Gilda's Club Seattle, (the Organization), is a Washington private not-for-profit corporation formed in 1996. Cancer Pathways offers programs of education, support, and community options for men, women, teens, and children living with cancer along with their families and friends. Programs are offered in Seattle and throughout the State of Washington with collaborating partners in varied locations such as hospitals, community centers, and schools.

#### **Basis of Presentation**

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles of the United States of America (GAAP) and are presented on the basis of the following classes of net assets:

*Unrestricted net assets* – Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily restricted net assets – Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that will be met either by actions of the Organization and/or passage of time. When donor time restrictions expire or when donor program restrictions are satisfied, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets. There were no temporarily restricted net assets at December 31, 2017 or 2016.

Permanently restricted net assets - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that the principal be maintained permanently by the Organization. The Organization is permitted to use the income earned on the related investments for general or specified operating purposes. There were no permanently restricted net assets at December 31, 2017 or 2016.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from the estimated amounts.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

The Organization may have amounts deposited with financial institutions in excess of federally insured limits during the year. At December 31, 2017 and 2016, this limit was exceeded. The Organization has not experienced losses in these accounts.

## NOTE 1. ORGANIZATION AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Investments

The Organization carries investments with readily determinable fair values at their fair value in the statements of financial position. Investments consist of common stock and mutual funds. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying statements of activities.

Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 157, *Fair Value Measurements* ("SFAS 157") defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value, and expands disclosures about financial instruments. This pronouncement does not require any new fair value measurements, SFAS 157 also establishes a fair value hierarchy, which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value that classifies the inputs used to calculate fair value. The standard describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

#### Level 1

Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities. Level 1 assets and liabilities include debt and equity securities that are traded in an active exchange market.

#### Level 2

Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices for quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated with observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities. Level 2 assets and liability include debt securities with quoted market prices that are traded less frequently than exchange-traded instruments.

#### Level 3

Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities. Level 3 assets and liabilities include financial instruments whose value is determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2017 AND 2016

#### NOTE 1. ORGANIZATION AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Fair value estimates are made at a specific point in time, based on available market information and judgments about the financial assets, including estimates of timing, amount or expected future cash flows, and the credit standing of the issuer. In some cases, the fair value estimates cannot be substantiated by comparisons to independent markets. In addition, the disclosed fair value may not be realized in the immediate settlement of the financial assets. The disclosed fair values do not reflect any premium or discount that could result from offering for sale at one time an entire holding or a particular financial asset.

#### Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are capitalized at cost or value as of the date of donation if donated. The assets are depreciated over their estimated useful lives on the straight-line basis. The Organization's policy is to capitalize long-lived assets with a cost of \$5,000 or more. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

Equipment: 3 to 15 years Building and improvements: 15 to 30 years

#### Deferred Revenue

Income from classes and events is deferred and recognized in the period in which the class or event occurs.

#### Restricted and Unrestricted Support and Revenue Recognition

Grant and contribution revenue that is restricted by the donor is reported as increases in unrestricted or temporarily restricted net assets, depending on the existence and/or nature of grantor or donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, that is, when a purpose or time restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. However, if a restriction is fulfilled in the same period in which the contribution is received, the Organization reports the support as unrestricted.

#### Donated Assets and Property and Equipment

Donated marketable securities and other noncash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair values at the date of donation. Donations of property and equipment are recorded as support at their estimated fair value at the date of the donation. Such donations are reported as unrestricted support unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose.

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### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2017 AND 2016

#### NOTE 1. ORGANIZATION AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### **Donated Services**

Donated services are recognized as revenue and corresponding expense when (a) the services received create or enhance non-financial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Organization. A number of volunteers provide valuable services throughout the year that are not recognized as contributions in the financial statements since the recognition criteria were not met.

#### **Expense Allocation**

The costs of providing various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities and in the statements of functional expenses. Management allocates expenses based upon the direct method when feasible and uses other allocation methods as appropriate to allocate common expense. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefitted.

#### Advertising Expense

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred and are presented as outreach & advertising in the statements of functional expenses.

#### Federal Income Taxes

The Organization is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from certain activities not related to the Organization's tax-exempt purpose, if any, is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Organization qualifies for the charitable deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509(a)(2). The Organization does not conduct any activities that are subject to the Unrelated Business Income Tax.

The Organization has determined there are no uncertain tax positions for the years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016 and the accompanying financial statements contain no interest or penalties with respect to federal income taxes. The Organization's federal income tax returns remain open for examination to the extent prescribed by the Internal Revenue Code.

#### Reclassifications

Certain balances from the December 31, 2016 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the current year presentation. These reclassifications have no impact on net income as previously stated.

### NOTE 2. GRANTS AND CONTRACTS RECEIVABLE

Grants and contracts receivable at December 31, 2017 and 2016 are expected to be collected within one year. No allowance was considered necessary at December 31, 2017 or 2016.

#### NOTE 3. <u>DONATED SERVICES</u>

The Organization did not receive any donated services during the year ended December 31, 2017. The Organization recorded \$18,900 of donated services during the year ended December 31, 2016. Services provided consisted of pro-bono legal services.

## NOTE 4. <u>INVESTMENTS</u>

The following schedule summarizes the Organization's investments at fair value as of December 31. All investments are classified under level 1 measurements within the fair value hierarchy.

#### NOTE 5. WASHINGTON STATE GRANT AND COMMITMENTS

During 2015, the state of Washington awarded a grant to the Organization. The grant was to be used for renovation of the Organization's building. The Grantor reimbursed all eligible project expenditures, up to a maximum of \$776,000. The renovated property must be held and used by the Organization for its charitable purpose for at least ten years from the date of the final grant payment. In the event that the Organization does not meet this commitment, the Washington State Department of Commerce reserves the right to recapture the funds disbursed under the grant.

The full grant amount was expended and received prior to December 31, 2017. 42% of total revenues and support related to this grant during the year ended December 31, 2017. There were no such concentrations during the year ended December 31, 2016.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2017 AND 2016

#### NOTE 6. MORTGAGE PAYABLE

The Organization obtained a mortgage loan to purchase land and building in Seattle, Washington. The Organization refinanced the mortgage loan by entering into a new ten year loan with an original principal balance of \$1,600,000 with Sound Community Bank on September 26, 2013. This loan was modified in December 2017. Prior to the modification, the interest rate was a fixed 4.5%, monthly principal and interest payments were \$8,900, and a final balloon payment was due at maturity on October 1, 2023. The modification changed the interest rate to 4.5% through December 2022, at that time, the interest rate changes to a variable rate. Monthly principal and interest payments decreased to \$8,013, and maturity was extended to December 1, 2027. The loan is secured by the Organization's land and building. Future minimum principal payments are as follows for the years ending December 31:

### NOTE 7. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS
